Communications

At our stated meeting December 2nd, we heard reports and had discussions on the status of the Temple and the Valley. Both reports were generally positive, but we still have work to do. One of my observations from the past year is the need to continue to improve our communications.

Effective communication can significantly enhance an organization's overall functioning and success. It involves the exchange of information in a way that is clear, concise, and purposeful. It is important that our communications are two-way, respectful, consistent, provides for open feedback channels to address any concerns and is sensitive to other points of view.

Experts say that regular communication can help keep members engaged and make them feel valued and included. Through open and honest communications we can provide feedback to the leaders of our organization so we can continually improve what we do and adapt to changing conditions.

Timely communications can help avoid conflicts. A recent power outage in Everett included our building and caused the elevator to shut down and fail. While the repair company was promptly called, it took days for the required parts to come in and then be installed. The problem was not communicated to all those that use our building. One group arrived for a stated meeting expecting to find the elevator working, understandably they were not

pleased. Letting everyone know of the issue right away could have helped manage their expectations and prepare workarounds.

Late in the year 2023 and early 2024, I made the effort to compose a brief email to give those who were unable to attend our meetings a sense of what we accomplished. I will restart this in 2025. Let me know if you find these messages helpful.

I am reluctant to continue to blame the pandemic for problems that we face today but one legacy is that our executive committee and temple board meetings have been on-line rather than in person. Face-to-face meetings are generally more effective and productive so starting

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this year our leadership meetings will take place in our building.

Recognizing that travel time can be burdensome to those that live some distance from Everett, it is my intention that these be hybrid meetings. The hardware has been purchased to set up teleconference capabilities in the third-floor library. Having removed obstacles to attendance it is expected that the members of the temple board and the Valley's leadership teams fulfill their responsibilities to the organization by making it to our executive committee and temple board meetings.

Speaking of hardware, I will be asking the Masonic groups that meet in our Temple if they would be willing to participate in the purchase of a large screen Let us work together to make 2025 a great year. tv and other equipment need to bring technology into the Lodge room. Our Blue Lodges have been given permission to make the business and educational portion of their meetings available for remote access. This equipment could also be used for presentations, movies etc.

Late 2023 a few changes were made to the Valley's Rite Bulletin. I will be asking our editor to see if we can do an update to the look and feel of this valuable communication tool. (I'll know he disagrees with me if this paragraph does not make it into the January issue.) Please provide your thoughts on what you would like included in our monthly newsletter and please, be a content contributor.

I will be asking the Temple Board to send out regular messages to those that use our building perhaps in the form of a newsletter. Also, when there is an urgent issue, it will be communicated to every group.

Lastly, I want to assure you that I make sincere efforts to listen and respond to you. Never hesitate to email me, call, or disagree with me in a meeting. I value your input and suggestions.



What can I do?

I'm sure many of our Scottish Rite Brothers have been asking this question for years. Either we have felt that we're too new to the Rite or we don't have the talent for acting. There are other ways to assist with the new class in 2025 to help make their year special.

There is always a need for more Brothers to help prepare the props and costumes for the degree. This is something that is normally worked on a couple of weeks prior to the Degree night. That allows us time to look over the equipment to ensure it is still in good working condition and make any adjustments needed.

The Sunday before each Degree, we have the set

up and final rehearsal. Some Degrees have simple stage props to set up, while others can be quite complicated. A few extra Brothers coming in on Sunday, would help the Valley look sharp the following evening.

Of course, we are always looking for more Brothers to step up and take a speaking role in in all of our degrees. Just ask the Degree Master what part you can do for the next Degree.

When you want a challenge, ask about becoming a Degree Master. In this position, you'll be directing the degree, assembling the cast and working with the Director of Works to ensure the props and costumes you need are ready to go.

The History of the Scottish Rite 32nd Degree Black Cap

The 32nd-degree black cap in the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry is worn by members who have reached the rank of a 32° Master of the Royal Secret. It signifies their commitment, achievements, and high standing within the Scottish Rite, Ancient and Accepted, Southern Jurisdiction (AASR, SJ), and also in Northern Masonic Jurisdictions. Here is a bit of history and context behind it:

Origins and Evolution

The tradition of wearing caps in Scottish Rite Free-masonry began in the early 19th century. Initially, caps were used as practical head coverings, but they gradually became symbols of rank and achievement. By the late 1800s, different colored caps had been adopted to signify the various stages and honors within the Scottish Rite. The black cap became associated with the 32nd degree, which is the highest regular degree that most Scottish Rite members achieve before potentially receiving honorary degrees.

The Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite, which is the oldest in the world, formalized this color distinction. Today, 32nd-degree Masons typically wear black caps, whereas the 33rd-degree honorary Masons wear white caps, and those who have been selected as Grand Cross recipients wear purple or red caps.

Symbolism and Meaning

The black cap worn by a 32nd-degree Scottish Rite Mason is a mark of his deep commitment to the principles of Freemasonry, particularly the Scottish Rite's



focus on philosophical teachings, moral character, and intellectual growth. The cap signifies completion of the journey through the Scottish Rite degrees (from the 4th to the 32nd degree), symbolizing enlightenment and dedication to service.

The color black often represents humility, solemnity, and respect in the context of Freemasonry, and the black

cap is worn with a sense of duty to the fraternity and society. While other appendant organizations within Freemasonry may use aprons or sashes as symbols, the Scottish Rite's use of caps highlights its unique traditions.

Traditions and Protocols


For Scottish Rite Masons, receiving the 32nd degree and the black cap is a respected milestone and is often commemorated with a special ceremony. The cap itself is treated with reverence, and its presentation is sometimes accompanied by a certificate or diploma of rank. Scottish Rite Masons are encouraged to wear their caps to official Scottish Rite functions but do not typically wear them outside formal Masonic settings.

The black cap thus holds an important place in Scottish Rite symbolism, honoring the rich history of Freemasonry, the value placed on personal integrity and the pursuit of knowledge, and the Masonic ideals of fraternity, charity, and service to others.

The History of Freemasons For the Month of January

Jan 06 – In 1759 Bro. George Washington married the widow Martha Custis. She had first married Daniel Parke Custis in 1749 and bore him four children, two of which died in childhood. Custis died in July, 1757, leaving Martha one of the wealthiest women in Virginia. Bro. Washington first met her in March, 1758 and lost no time in proposing marriage, and was just as quickly accepted. Bro. Washington took his new wife and her family to his Mount Vernon estate. They had no children of their own. Martha died in 1802.

Jan 06—In 1941, Bro. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, 32nd US President, citing what he called the "Four Freedoms," asked Congress to approve a multimillion-dollar pogrom of aid to the countries fighting the war against Nazi Germany. The President called the proposed lend-lease program vital in promoting the defense of the nation, His speech outlined four goals: (1) Freedom of speech and expression; (20 Freedom of people to worship God in their own way; (3) Freedom from want; and (4) Freedom from Fear,. All of the points referred to the Freedoms as fundamental "to all peoples anywhere in the world."

Jan 08– In 1815 British forces lost more than 2,000 men in an attack on New Orleans, LA. Defending US troops were led by General and Bro. Andrew Jackson, who became a popular hero as a result of the victory. Neither side, however, knew that the War of 1812 had ended two weeks earlier with the signing of the Treaty of Ghent, December 24, 1814. Bro. Jackson went on to become the 7th President of the US and a very active Freemason. He was Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee from October, 1822 to October 1824, was a member of Harmony Lodge No. 1 at Nashville, TN, an honorary member of Federal Lodge No. 1 at Washington, DC, and was also a Royal Arch Mason.

Jan 14 –In 1943, US President and Bro. Franklin Delano Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Bro. Winston Churchill opened a conference in Morocco.. The conference would end on January 24 with the announcement by both wartime leaders and Masons that the war would not end until the allies achieved the unconditional surrender of Germany, Italy and Japan Bro. Roosevelt would be heard to say that he was determined to destroy the "philosophies of those countries which are based on conquest and the subjugation of other people. The conference would also lead to the opening of a southern front and the invasion of Sicily.

Jan 23– In 1915, Bro. Potter Stewart was born at Jackson, MI. Bro. Stewart was nominated as Associate Justice of the US supreme Court by President Dwight Eisenhower January 17, 1959. He took the oath of office on May 15 of that year. Bro. Stewart retired in July, 1981 and died December 17, 1985, at Putney, VT, five days after suffering a stroke. He is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

- o 15°-18° (Chapter of Rose Croix): Explore themes of faith, hope, and the victory of light over darkness. These lessons are especially poignant at the start of a new year, symbolizing triumph and renewal.
- o 19°-30° (Council of Kadosh): Delve into civic responsibility, personal sacrifice, and justice—reminding members to contribute meaningfully to society in the year ahead.
- o 31°-32° (Consistory): Emphasize unity and wisdom, urging reflection on one's role in the greater community of Masonry and the world.

Esoteric and Spiritual Reflections The Scottish Rite encourages meditation on life's deeper questions. The New Year provides a fitting time to engage in such introspection, aligning with the Rite's spiritual aspirations.

During 2024 we had 6 Initiations; 2 Affiliations; 0 Reinstatements; 6 Deaths (Ceremony of Remembrance we honored 6 brothers); 1 Demit; and 0 Suspensions for non-payment of dues. The present status of our annual dues collections are as follows:

Active Members with dues paid in full 41 (24.8%); Active Members with a 2025 dues balance 33 (20.%); Active Members with arrears balance (2024- 2025) 9 (6.1%); Active Members that are Dues Exempt or 50-Year Members 14 (8.5%) and Active Endowed Paid Life Members 67 (40.6%) for a total of 165 Members = 100%

Those members who still had unpaid dues for 2023 (1)-2024 (9)-2025 (33) =(43) have each either been mailed or e-mailed a dues reminder notice at the end-of-the year, as well as three reminder mailings from Supreme 33° in Washington, DC. The one member now due for 2023-2024-2025 will be suspended for non-payment of dues (NPD).

As of this writing – we have four (4) petitions for the 2025 class. If you are holding a petition, you must get them submitted so they can be voted on. We are scheduled to begin the 2025 class on January 6th, 2025.

All members were directly mailed their 2025 new plastic dues cards by Supreme Council 33°. Those with either Life or 50-year Life memberships already have their gold cards. If you are one of the 43 in arrears as noted above, please feel free to contact me at 425-610-4561 or via e-mail at terrygrove50@yahoo.com.

Double-Headed Eagle


- Meaning: The double-headed eagle is the primary emblem of the Scottish Rite. It represents duality—east and west, heaven and earth, material and spiritual. The two heads looking in opposite directions signify vigilance and the balance between opposing forces.
- It is often depicted holding a **sword**, symbolizing justice and protection.

This symbol is particularly associated with the 32° (Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret).
