This Little Light of Mine

The morning before our Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal I talked with one of my relatives. After the regular pleasantries and catching up on our lives, our conversation turned to current events. She expressed a feeling of helplessness when it came to effecting change when odds seem insurmountable. Her concerns centered around politics and the state of our nation. At the time, I had no answer for her, but our ceremony reminded me that there is an answer. It does not matter which side of the political spectrum you are on; the solution is the same.

As a reminder, our Ceremony consists of four parts: The first we remember the Knights Rose Croix who passed the previous year; the second is the Mystic Banquet, where lessons from the Jewish Passover & Christian Last Supper are given to us; the third is the Tenebrae, the gradual extinguishing of the candles; the fourth, Fiat Lux, relighting the lights.

During the Tenebrae we are told that when the Great Architect created the heavens and the earth, there was darkness and He alone was the One True Light. He provided the Sun and stars so all his creatures might live. But the Divine Light does not always shine everywhere as brightly as it should. Throughout history men have appeared:

- * to dispel the darkness of fanaticism and superstition and elevate humankind with the Light of Truth. But the people blinded by vices, put them to death:
- * their pure and lofty lessons were intended to ensure the happiness of mankind by proclaiming perfect equality and freedom;
- * to persuade all men to be upright and to become one family of brethren;
- * to illuminate the mind with science, philosophy, and knowledge;

Scottish Rite Symbolism

The **Scottish Rite** is a branch of Freemasonry known for its deep symbolism and advanced degrees beyond the basic three degrees of Blue Lodge Masonry. Two significant symbols in Scottish Rite are the **triangle** and the **number 32**.

The Triangle in Scottish Rite

The triangle is a powerful Masonic symbol representing wisdom, strength, and beauty, as well as the concept of the Divine Trinity (often interpreted in different

ways, such as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in Christian symbolism or mind, body, and soul in a more philosophical sense). The Scottish Rite, which is rich in esoteric and philosophical teachings, uses the triangle to convey balance, unity, and enlightenment.

In some Scottish Rite emblems, an equilateral triangle encloses other sacred symbols, such as the double-headed eagle or the Hebrew letter Yod ,(*)which represents the



ineffable name of God.

The Number 32 in Scottish Rite

In the Scottish Rite system, there are 32 degrees, with the 32nd degree (Master of the Royal Secret) being the highest degree attainable before the honorary 33rd degree (which is awarded for exceptional service).

Each degree from the 4th to the 32nd imparts different moral, philosophical, and spiritual lessons, drawing from various religious, historical, and mythological traditions. The **32nd degree represents a high level of Masonic enlightenment and commitment to service and brotherhood**.

The combination of the **triangle and 32** often appears in Scottish Rite regalia and symbolism, emphasizing **spiritual ascent**, **knowledge**, **and the path to higher wisdom**.

The Scottish Rite 10th Degree (as communicated by Chat GPT)

The 10th Degree of the **Scottish Rite**, titled **"Master Elect of Fifteen"**, is part of the Lodge of Perfection within the Scottish Rite Freemasonry system. It focuses on themes of integrity, justice, and the importance of exposing and correcting wrongdoing.

Key Elements of the 10th Degree:

1. Historical Background:

• The degree's legend is based on events after the construction of King Solomon's Temple. It involves the pursuit of justice for crimes committed against the temple and its workers, symbolizing the need to uphold moral and ethical standards.

- It teaches that justice and fairness must be pursued, even at great personal sacrifice.
- It emphasizes the importance of loyalty, duty, and courage in confronting evil or wrongdoing.

3. Symbolism:

- The number 15 often refers to the group of "elect" individuals selected to bring justice, symbolizing perseverance and unity.
- The tools and imagery often include representations of judgment, light (as a metaphor for truth), and swords (symbolizing the cutting away of falsehood).

4. Ritual and Drama

- Like other Scottish Rite degrees, the 10th Degree is conveyed through allegorical drama. Members may witness or participate in a ritualized enactment that teaches its lessons.
- This drama explores the pursuit of the traitors who disrupted the harmony of the Temple's work, illustrating themes of law and moral accountability.

5. Modern Reflection:

The degree encourages members to reflect on their responsibilities as individuals and citizens to uphold justice and act with integrity in all aspects of life.

The History of Freemasons For the Month of May

May 6—In 1856, born at Cresson, PA, was Bro. Robert E. Peary, who organized and led eight Arctic expeditions and is credited with discovering the North Pole on April 6, 1909. He was a member of the explorers lodge, Kane No. 454, New York City, to which he gave the Masonic flag which was displayed at Independence Bay, Greenland, May 20, 1895. On March 30, 1920, Kane Lodge presented his widow with a special medal in honor of her distinguished husband. Bro. Peary also presented two specimens of the great meteorite he found during his explorations to the New York Grand Lodge of Masons . Bro. Peary died February 20, 1920.

May 8—In 1884 at Lamar, MO was born Bro. Harry S Truman who was to become the 33rd President of the US. succeeding to that office on the death of Bro. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, April 12, 1945. He served until January 20, 1953. Bro. Truman was the last of nine US Presidents who did not attend college. His birthday is a holiday in Missouri. He was raised March 18, 1909 in Belton Lodge No. 450, Grandview, MO. The following year he became Junior Warden but when Belton Lodge separated to form a new Lodge, Grandview 618, Bro. Truman was made the first Master. After World War I he returned to become District Deputy Grand Lecturer and District Deputy Grand Master of the 59th Masonic District. In 1930 he became Grand Pursuant. In September, 1940, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Missouri, and a few weeks later, US Senator from Missouri. Bro. Truman died at Kansas City, MO. December 26, 1972

May 13—By 1938 Bro. Louis Armstrong was already a nationally famous jazz cornet and trumpet player, singer, and bandleader. Having brought New Orleans-style jazz to an unprecedentedly wide audience, he had almost single handedly transformed the music from a group form into an art for the individual soloist. On May 13 of that year, in a studio session in New York, Bro. Louis Armstrong and his ten-piece orchestra recorded a jazz arrangement of the religious song, "When the Saints Go Marching In." Enormously popular, the tune became a jazz standard, as well as one of Bro. Armstrong's signature songs. The recording captured the exuberance and technical virtuosity of Bro. Armstrong's unique trumpet style. Bro. Louis Armstrong's Masonic affiliation was Prince Hall.

May 16 - in 1868, the US Senate failed by one vote to convict Bro. Andrew Johnson, then President of the US, as it took its first ballot on one of 11 articles of impeachment against him. His close association with Freemasonry was one of the factors that led to his impeachment trial. Thaddeus Stevens, the anti-Mason, was a ringleader in the impeachment proceedings against Bro. Johnson. Bro. Johnson died July 31, 1875. He was a member of Greeneville Lodge No. 119, Greenville, TN. He was also a Knight Templar and belonged to the Scottish Rite.


May 27—In 1941, amid rising world tensions, President and Bro. Franklin Roosevelt proclaimed an "unlimited national emergency." The move followed the deliberate sinking by German U -boat U-69 of the unarmed American freighter Robert Moore. In a message to Congress Bro. Roosevelt proclaimed an unlimited national emergency while accusing Germany of having become "an international outlaw.




