But for now I will not use AI to create the articles I include in our Rite Bulletin. While again struggling to put together a few words this month, I received an email from Microsoft inviting me to use an option in Word t

#### "Say goodbye to writer's block

I already had a topic and had started the research, collected quotes, and put down a few of my thoughts on a subject. Figured, why not try AI? What Copilot created was formatted well, correct grammar, footnotes, good paragraph size but did use some words I would never use. Using Word's Editor, the statistics showed a reading grade level of 17.6. Granted the subject matter (alchemy & Freemasonry) was a little deep, a 17.6 grade level is much higher than the 9-10 I usually aim for. A quick internet search said most Americans read at about the 8<sup>th</sup> grade level.

Using AI to draft a document did make me better acquainted with a tool I have just started to explore. But for now I will continue to just use AI and the internet to help with research, not to avoid burning brain cells & putting fingers on the keyboard.

I felt a little guilty even considering using Copilot to draft a document but using tools can make our lives easier. The circular saw blade replaced the two-man pit saw to rip timber into lumber. As electric motors became smaller and more affordable, the circular saw made carpentry much easier. Few house builders would ever consider eliminating power tools from their tool bags.

Gasoline powered chainsaws replaced axes and misery whips; steam replaced waterpower; gasoline engines replaced the horse and ox; word processors replaced typewriters; the list goes on and on. I just recycled my paperback thesaurus and style guides. It has been years since I looked in a paper dictionary or encyclopedia. New tools makes tasks easier but there are trade-offs.

It was not that many years ago that we could believe that a photo or video showed the truth, then came photoshop and CGI video. We have all seen or heard about the misuse of AI; fake pictures, cobbled together audio that proports to

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what someone said. Think of the damage George Washington could have done to cherry trees if he had a chain saw.

Tools are to make our tasks easier, quicker, and conceivably better. We as Freemasons and more especially Scottish Rite Masons, should never reject out of hand changes in technology. Just because it was not done that way in my day, does not mean that it was a better way.

I am trying hard not to use the word innovation but through innovation we can keep up with the advances offered by improved tools. Not all innovations are about technology, Illustrious Brother Albert Pike took early versions of the Scottish Rite Rituals and made considerable changes. Around 2004, the Supreme Council released revisions to the Pike rituals. Why? Maybe to make them more concise, relevant, and easier to understand. Some old past masters, I'm sure, were not pleased with these innovations.

So why do I choose not to use this new tool in Microsoft Word? I use spell checker, look for synonyms, use the editor function to check for errors and even use

the option to search the internet for similar phrasings in my articles. It would make my life a little easier to ask Copilot to create an article based on the input I provide, make a few changes, and call it my own. I choose to author these articles because I tend to be lazy and forcing myself to draft a few words each month helps me keep my mind active. What I provide may not sound as professional, be as thoroughly researched and contain errors but they are my creations for better or worse. The process helps keep my mind active and I can say it is mine.

We need to resist the temptation to become lazy in both our Blue Lodges and the Scottish Rite. Using tools and technology to improve the Lodge experience should not just make it easier for us. A video of our Degrees, in full costume, professional sets and actors that know their lines perfectly would be convenient. But surely it would take away from the candidate experience.

I will never say never but for now I will not use a computer program to create my Rite Bulletin articles and when I do, I will let you know.

# Scottish Rite Symbolism The Masonic Trestle Board

The **Masonic Trestle Board** is a symbolic and practical concept in Freemasonry. Historically and symbolically, it plays a central role in Masonic teachings and rituals. Here's a breakdown of what it represents and how it's used:

#### ☐ Historical Meaning:

In operative Masonry (the stonemasons of the Middle Ages), a **trestle board** was a physical board used by the Master Mason to draw out the designs and plans for the building project—sort of like an architect's blueprint or chalkboard.

Symbolic Significance: In speculative Freemasonry (modern Freemasonry), the **Trestle Board** is a symbol of the divine plan or the spiritual blue-print for one's life.

- It represents **moral and spiritual guidance**, as well as the teachings and goals that Masons should strive for.

- The Trestle Board is sometimes referenced during degree work or lectures.

- A place where one mentally "draws" the plans for building their "spiritual temple."

# The History of Freemasons For the Month of June

June 03—In 1888 the famous comic ballad "Casey at the Bat" appeared in the San Francisco Examiner. Though attributed to "anonymous" the author was serious poet Ernest L. Thayer who was paid \$5 for the effort that led to most of his other works being forgotten. But it triggered a happy career for Bro. DeWolff Hopper who recited "Casey at the Bat" for the first time at Wallack's Theater in New York City. And no fewer than 10,000 times after that as part of his comic repertoire. The recitation, which made both the poem and himself famous, took five minutes and 40 seconds, and never failed to "bring down the house." Bro. Hopper was raised in Pacific Lodge No 233, New York city, in 1890, and was 32 deg. AASR (NJ), and a member of Mecca Shrine Temple in New York City. He died September 23, 1935.

June 05—In 1947 Bro. and US Secretary of State George C. Marshall, speaking at Harvard University, outlined an aid program for Europe that came to be known as the famed Marshall Plan. Bro. Marshall had received many decorations and high honors including the Nobel Peace Prize in 1953. General of the Army and Brother George C. Marshall was the recipient of the New York Grand Lodge Distinguished Achievement Award in 1945 ... the highest honor that can be bestowed on a Mason by this Grand Lodge. The same year this high honor was also presented to Admiral of the Fleet and Brother Ernest Joseph King. Bro. Marshall was made a Mason "at sight" on December 16, 1941 by Ara M. Daniels, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of District of Columbia, ion the Scottish Rite Cathedral of the District. Distinguished leaders from many states were Present . Bro., Marshall's father had been an active Freemason at Allentown, PA, being High Priest of Union Chapter No. 165, (RAM) in 1889. and Commander of Uniontown Commandery No. . 49, (KT) in 1883.

**June 08**—In 1845, Bro. Andrew Jackson -- a proud Mason who became seventh President of the US -- died at Nashville, NY. He became a national hero when as a major general in the US Army he was ordered to defend New Orleans in the war of 1812.He was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee October 7, 1822, and again in 1823, serving until October, 1824.

June 11—In 1776, the Continental Congress formed a committee to draft a Declaration of Independence from Britain. Named to the committee were Virginian Thomas Jefferson, John Adams of Massachusetts; Bro. Benjamin Franklin, Pennsylvania Bro. Robert Livingston of New York, and Bro. Roger Sherman. of Massachusetts. James Smith, a Dubliner and George Taylor from Belfast were both Delegates from Pennsylvania, and Matthew Thornton, from Dublin, represented New Hampshire. Jefferson is credited with the writing.

June 12—In 1929 the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was dedicated at Cooperstown, NY. More than 200 individuals have been honored for there contributions to the game of baseball by into the Baseball Hall of Fame. Of the first five players to be so honored, three were Freemasons: Bro. Tyrus R. "Ty" Cobb of Royston Lodge No.52, Detroit, MI; Bro. John "Honus" Wagner of Centennial Lodge No. 544, Carnegie, PA; Bro. Christopher "Christie:" Mathewson of New York City's Architect Lodge No. 519. The non Masons were Walter Johnson and Babe Ruth.

### Flag Day, June 14, 2025 OLD GLORY SPEAKS

This flag which we honor and under which we serve is the emblem of our unity, our power, our thoughts and our purpose as a nation.

In the early 1940's, the United States, along with the other allied nations of the world, were drawn into the Word War II on two different fronts. This flag hung in recruiting offices all over our nation, and men and women from all walks of life flocked to it. Regardless of which branch of the service they joined, each and every one of them took an oath, to protect and defend it against all enemies, both foreign and domestic. At which time, each and every one of them signed a Check, a blank check. It was made out to you, the citizens of the United States of America, in the amount of "My Life".

If this flag could talk it would tell you it saw that check cashed more times than it cares to remember. It has seen the incoming tides in both the Atlantic and Pacific run red with the blood of our fallen youth. If you can read, your thanks and gratitude should go to your teachers, but if you can read English, you might consider thanking a veteran, for you do not salute the ancestry of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Reich, nor do you bow to the rising sun. Many gave up all of their tomorrows so we can enjoy ours here today.

Thirty-one words. We learned them as small children, we have memorized them, we said them in school every day. The question is: How does this piece of cloth come to hold such power. The answer is the sun never shined on anything more beautiful or of greater worth. It is truly the symbol of our freedom, and if it could talk it would tell you a great deal of its history.

It would tell you I was conceived in the dreams of liberty and the hopes of freedom. I was designed and made by the hands of Betsy Ross and her sewing basket became my cradle. And Although I was never an orphan, I was adopted by the Continental Congress in 1777 and with a tremendous amount of both pride and pleasure, I became the national emblem of a newly born nation on this continent, desperately fighting for survival and destined to bring to all of its people a new concept of life, liberty and pursuit of happiness.

In one form or another I have been many places and have seen many events of our American history. I saw the signal that started the midnight ride of Paul Revere, and I heard John Paul Jones state, when asked to surrender ", I have not yet begun to fight" and I saw Molly Pitcher take the cannon swab from her dead husband's hand and help carry on the fight for freedom and I rode with Ethan Allen and the Green Mountain Boys.

I was there when George Washington became the Commander-in-Chief and I felt the biting cold of Valley Forge and brought comfort to the tired and hungry troops of the Continental Army. I was flown from the masts of Old Ironsides and above the decks of the Yankee and China Clippers. I was there in the late twilight at Fort McHenry and inspired Francis Scott Key to write the Star-Spangled Banner which was to become our National Anthem. I blazed the trail west with Daniel Boone, Davy Crockett and Lewis and Clark.

I was carried through the Halls of Montezuma and to the shores of Tripoli. I charged up the slopes of San Juan Hill with Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders and I stayed with the Boys in World War One until it was over – over there. I was with them on the battle fields of France and saw many of the youth and manhood of our nation fall and lie silent in death. They had given their last full measure of devotion and the war was over for them forever. But I have kept my lonely watch over their graves and stayed to watch the poppies grow row on row between the crosses in Flanders' Fields.

I was there at Pearl Harbor, Berlin, the Battle of the Bulge, the Ardenne, and on the beaches at Anzio, Guam, Guadalcanal, Pelielieu, The Philippines, Saipan, The Solomand Tarawa. I have been through the valley of death on Okinawa, Midway and the Coral Sea. I was raised by six brave men during the battle on Iwo Jima. I was there on the French coast at Normandy on D-Day.

As the landing craft approached the beaches, I heard the squad leaders call out to their troops "30 seconds to the beach, may your God be with you"

When the ramps came down, they came face to face with a gauntlet of barbed wire, landmines, artillery and mortar shells dropping everywhere. The German zipper ripped and the bullets fell like rain drops.

No amount of medical training could have possibly prepared these young medics for the carnage that awaited them on the beaches.

Thousands met the supreme architect of their universe that morning, without ever knowing the outcome of this war they had been drawn into or the importance of the sacrifice they had just made. The future of the free world was decided that day, at a great cost. Many of these young men had seen their last morning sunrise and would never to become grandfathers

And I sank beneath the waves with four heroic chaplains who gave up their life vests and went down with their ship to honored glory. I waved gloriously above the decks of the battleship Missouri in Tokyo Bay on that victorious day September 2,1945.

I waved proudly over our troops as they fought at the Chosin Reservoir and in the frozen mountains of Korea, the steaming jungles of Southeast Asia where Continued on Page 7 Old Glory Speaks
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we fought an elusive enemy in an
unforgiving terrain. I was there at
the World Trade Center in New York
City, the Pentagon in Washington, D.
C. and a lonely field in Pennsylvania on the that fateful day of September 11, 2001. I was there in
Bosnia, Somalia, Iraq and Afghanistan.

I am many things to many people. I am an inseparable link in the chain that binds people of our country. Because I am a symbol of our great country, our enemies would choose to destroy me; but they dare not. I am protected by the mighty land armies of the Nation, the powerful and deadly fleet of the Navy and the Screaming Eagles and Flying Fortresses of the Air Force, watching

and waiting to swoop down and destroy anything that might harm me. Throughout our short history as a nation whenever danger threatened millions of Americans have left their homes and families to defend me and the nation for which I stand...many hundreds of thousands never to return.

Yet, they are here wrapped forever with my folds, their purity is remembered in my stripes of white, Their blood has given me my stripes of red, Their courage is embedded in my blue, and their souls are cradled in my stars where I will watch over them forever for we are truly one nation under whatever God you chose to believe in.

I drape the caskets of our Nation's heroes, borne to their final resting place; the caskets of presidents, generals, admirals, and hum-

ble privates. I proudly guard the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and it is I who feel their tears when I am placed in the trembling arms of grieving parent at the grave of their son or daughter who has made the ultimate sacrifice for your freedom. Wherever free men gather; wherever there is justice, equality, faith, hope, charity, truth and brotherly love; there, too, am I.
